13th Hopes High for World Jamboree

Every four years a different country hosts a World Scout Jamboree. The last such event was held in North America and Mexico, and the one before that in Japan, with members from our Scout group attending each one. The next one is to be held in South Korea in 2023.

18 places have been allocated to the Wimbledon & Wandle Scout district, of which we are a part, and 14 of our Scouts/Explorers have applied to go.



Along with those who have applied from other groups in the district, they will attend an event in January where they will be introduced to the kinds of activities they would be taking part in at the jamboree. After that, the lucky ones will be selected at random. They then have 18 months of team building and fund raising before flying off for the 2-week adventure.

The following week, on November 20th, the Raynes Park War memorial, erected in St Saviour's grounds, was rededicated after its restoration, exactly 100 years after it was originally dedicated in 1921. Guests included relatives of some of the 97 men whose names are inscribed on the memorial. To add to the sense of occasion, Skip gave two talks before the event. The first told the story of the restoration that took place during 2018 to 2021, and the exhibition and fundraising launch that the Scout group was heavily involved with in. The second focused on Wing Commander Frank Brock who lived in Raynes Park and is commemorated on the memorial. He was a member of the family that owned the Brock Fireworks Company and invented a number of pyrotechnic devices that undoubtedly changed the course of WW1. He was killed in action during the April 1918 raid on Zeebrugge harbour.
