We were honoured by the attendance of District Commissioner, Dave Bixby and District Training Manager Alison Edwards. Each presented a number of awards.

Alison presented Explorer Scouts Amy Chilcott and James Lyon with their Young Leader Awards earned through taking leadership roles in the Beaver section over the last year or so.

Dave presented Scout Patrol Leader Heidi Chilcott with her Chief Scout's Gold Award, and Beaver Scout Harris Li with his Chief Scout's Bronze Award. Both of these awards are the highest that can be achieved in their respective sections.

Assistant Cub Scout Leader, Paul Carse, was presented with his Wood Badge recognising that he has completed his basic training to be a leader with the Cub Pack.

He also presented Malcolm and Fiona Miles with their 30-year service awards. They joined as section assistants in 1992, Fiona assisting with the Beaver Colony and Malcolm with the Scouts. They are the

second longest serving leaders the Group has ever had and each have barely missed a meeting in that time.

Skip presented Chris Scott with a Thanks Badge for his support on many trips and meetings over the last 5 years and Mya Patel with the Scout of the Year Award recognising attendance and achievement across a wide range of events and activities over the past year.

Earlier in the term Steve Lyon (Owl), our Beaver Scout Leader, was presented with his 10-year service award. Steve joined as Assistant Beaver Scout Leader in 2012, moving over to lead the Cub Pack in 2015 before returning to lead the Beaver Colony in 2021. He has also been a regular helper at the Scout section meetings since the end of lockdown.

Skip was also able to present our Treasurer, Patrick Daly, with his 5-year service Award. Despite being confined to a wheelchair following a stroke 30 years ago, Patrick has provided an invaluable service to the Scout Group for the last 7 ½ years. Unfortunately, due to Covid the presentation of the Award was somewhat delayed!

Congratulations to all those receiving recognition for their outstanding achievements in, and contribution to, Scouting in the Group.



Cubs Learn the Basics and Much More

Crossover Camp

The annual Crossover Camp provides an opportunity for the older cubs and new Scouts to learn the basics of Scout Camping. This year's location was Park Farm adjacent to Banstead Wood. They learnt how to pitch tents, collect wood, light fires, cook and use a map and compass to navigate around wild country. For some it was the first time they had been away overnight without their parents and they came through with flying colours.

The Cubs learned how to communicate with her Bliss board and were tasked with finding their names that Baloo had arranged to be printed in Braille; a great way to learn a different way of communicating.

For several years the Cubs have taken responsibility for creating a Remembrance Day display in St Saviour's church. This year the Cubs lead the making of a poppy display using salt dough. Well done to Scott for the idea and for explaining how to do it.

In November, fireworks were enjoyed by all and tied in with the personal safety badge and, after all that has gone on in the last couple of years, a way to celebrate with noise and colour.

Sewing is a skill widely overlooked in school and most Scouts join the troop clueless about how to sew on their badges (along, sadly, with many of their parents!). So, it was great to see Young Leader, Emily Coups, leading Cub Sewing Bees, ably supported by Rikki and Ikki. The result was lavender bags that they could give as Christmas gifts.

Other useful skills the Cubs learnt from the leaders were how to change a light bulb, wiring a plug and laying out cutlery for a five-course meal.

The book readers badge was a more sedate evening. David Walliams and Roald Dahl were the most read authors and each six had to mime their favourite or most interesting book.

The troop also maintained its preeminent position in the District Incident Hike winning for the fourth successive time and also clinching the 2nd, 4th and 5th places, with each patrol leader leading a team.

In place of the normal Autumn Mountain trip, the Scouts and Explorers undertook a Surrey Three Peaks Challenge. Although not the official event, it followed the same route. The idea is to start at Box Hill then walk to Leith Hill and on to Holmbury Hill. The Scouts were tasked with completing this challenge – a total distance of around 11 miles – and the Explorers to complete the circuit by returning to their starting point at Box Hill.

12 scouts took part along with 11 leaders and parents and one Cub undertaking the 11-mile route while five Explorers (including three from another unit) completed the full 22 miles.

The weather was great, the views terrific and a great time was had by all!

Members of the Unit were privileged to be invited to represent Greater London South West (GLSW) at a service of remembrance for ten members of the 1st Mortlake Sea Scout Troop who lost their lives when the Whaler they were sailing in capsized off the coast of Holland in 1950. The bodies of six of those Scouts washed up on the Dutch Island of Texel and their graves have been tended by the local Scouts ever since. After the service the GLSW contingent, including the SSESU members, travelled to Texel stopping in Amsterdam and Paris on the way with all expenses covered by a sponsor.
