Glorious Weather Meets Snowdon Adventurers

The Scouts and Explorers had an exhilarating trip up to Snowdonia for this popular annual event. Contrary to early forecasts, the weather was fantastic - sunny with a chill in the air, perfect for walking. Despite the fact that 8 of the 21 scouts had never been on a mountain trip before, they managed to ascend the 947m Y Garn peak starting at Ogwen and scrambling up the Devil's Kitchen Gully. Meanwhile, the Explorers tackled Nantle Ridge from Rhyd Ddu.

The second day saw the Explorers tackle Tryfan from the north side before dropping down over the boulders to the south to the start of the scramble up Bristly Ridge then and a short walk up to Glyder Fach. Meanwhile the Scouts visited Copper Kingdom on the Island of Anglesey exploring what was once the largest copper mine in the world. This was followed by a coastal walk.

On the third day the Scouts walked up Snowdon via the south ridge starting and finishing at Rhyd Ddu and meeting the Explorers on the Summit who had started at Pen Y Pass and bagged Crib Goch on the way.

The evenings were spent playing games including the tradition Annual Donkey Championships won for the unprecedented third time by Reggie Bodle, with Max a worthy runner up, watched by the Scouts and Explorers several of whom glammed up for the electrifying final.

The Donkey playing community was shocked this week by the revelation that reigning World Donkey Champion, Reggie Bodle, is retiring from his record-breaking career. The announcement from his agent came a fortnight after he won the coveted Donkey trophy for the third consecutive time at the 13th Wimbledon/ SSESU trip to Snowdonia.

Reggie started his career as a rookie player in 2014 and fought his way up the greasy pole of donkeying learning the dark arts of winning from previous masters and inventing a few of his own. Many said his well-known sleight of hand acquired through the world of magic (he was a member of the junior Magic Circle) gave him an unfair advantage.
